But all of them will get you thinking about your fly fishing game and what you can do to improve it. You'll learn that having the ability to let go of all your preconceived notions often results in success and may ultimately carry over into a more thoughtful and innovative approach to all of your days on the water.

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#### 25 Ways to Elevate Your Game

Ed Engle has been an avid fly fisherman for the past 40 years and has fly fished throughout the continental United States, Alaska, Mexico, Chile, Argentina, Canada and Europe for a variety of game fish species, but with a special emphasis on trout. He was born in Virginia, though has lived most of his life in Colorado. He got into fly fishing when he saw people catching fish using this method, expressed a desire to do it and was fortunate when his dad gave him a starter kit. Ed attended the University of Colorado in Boulder and graduated with a degree in biology. Living in Colorado, Ed has had ample opportunity to perfect his skills on all kinds of streams, using all types of flies. Today his home and office are just west of Colorado Springs, within 40 miles of the South Platte River, one of Colorado's premier tailwaters.

Ed's fly fishing articles have appeared regularly in newspapers and magazines for more than 35 years. In the 1970's, his articles on nymphing techniques were among the first to appear in national fly fishing magazines. Since that time he has taught thousands of fly fishers the subtle art of nymphing through his books and articles, on-the-water seminars and at his popular nymphing class

sponsored by the Fly Fishing

Show.

Ed is especially interested in small fly tactics and techniques. His small fly research has taken him to many of the west's famous tailwaters and spring creeks across the country. He is also dedicated to fly fishing small streams for beautiful wild trout. Ed balances his interest in the "small side of fly fishing" with the avid pursuit of king salmon on the fly.

Ed is a regular contributor to the *Boulder Daily Camera* and *Gray's Sporting Journal*. In addition, he has written for *American Angler*, *Fly Fisherman*, *Fly Rod & Reel*, *Flyfishing & Tying Journal*, *Trout*, *Fly Tyer*, *Sports Afield*, and *Saltwater Fly Fishing*.

If we look at the books he has authored we can see yet another reason he is so qualified to lead us on this journey. Ed's most recent book, *Trout* Lessons (Stackpole, 2010), considers what to do when your usual fly fishing solutions don't work. His interest in tying and fishing small flies led to the publication of *Tying Small Flies* (Stackpole, 2004) and Fishing Small Flies (Stackpole, 2005). The two-volume set is credited with helping create the current surge of interest in pursuing trout with small flies. Ed's dedication to fishing bamboo fly rods resulted in the publication of Splitting Cane (Stackpole, 2002) which chronicled the life and craftsmanship of sixteen working rod makers. His first fly fishing book, Fly Fishing the Tailwaters (Stackpole, 1991), was a groundbreaking explanation of how to fish the regulated rivers found below dams.

Ed's current projects include writing posts for his popular *Lone Angler Journal* blog, work on a new book, coming up with new small fly patterns, and teaching at fly fishing seminars throughout the country.

## **Spring on the Bighorn**

After a week of cool weather in LA and below freezing temperatures in Montana, six stalwart Wilderness Fly Fishers left for the Bighorn on May 1st, prepared for more of the same, but happily it was not to be. Greg Dahlem, John Dalton, Tom Rasmussen, Art Siegel, Doug Hall, and Peter Haight flew to Billings, lunched at the Montana Brewery Company and drove southeast through showers and clouds to Fort Smith's Leaning Tree Lodge. Welcomed warmly by Rachel Stroda, we settled in with hors d'oeuvres and pork loin dinner. The next morning the temperature was 43 when we got to the river, and rose to a comfortable 65 by midday, sun and clouds, and that weather pattern held for the entire three fishing days. Our guides were Mark Stroda for John and Art, Brent Downey for Tom and Doug (Brent had guided for several of us in other years), and J.D. Roberts, a new guide at the lodge, for Greg and myself.

Fishing, by Bighorn standards, was slow. The extremely cold weather the past week had left the water temperature at 40 degrees, resulting in lethargic fish and insignificant hatches of

Baetis mayflies. But still, the river is one of the most reliably productive waters in Montana or elsewhere for good sized rainbow and brown trout, and it did not disappoint. However, it put us into hunting for active fish, and not just nonstop catching, as several of us had experienced before.

### **Spring on the Big Horn**

Brent and J.D. put us in at the "Afterbay" and floated to the "Bighorn" pullout. Mark took John and Art to the "Three Mile" launch site to start their float. Greg and I caught about six each, evenly spread out through the day, nymphing with scuds and sowbugs in the morning and stripping white streamers and Marlon Rampy Clousers in the afternoon. Tom and Doug did about as well with Brent. Art and John had a less productive morning, but were redeemed by Mark's now famous "Last Chance Hole", used by few other guides on the river just above the takeout.

At this time of year wildlife around us is extraordinary: hundreds of geese, some nesting right

next to us as we fished from shore, ducks of a dozen varieties, herons, soaring pelicans, turkeys, vultures, eagles, and even cock pheasants clucking from the shore, and the occasional muskrat swimming in front of our boat were all observed.

The second day was warmer and clear. Greg and I fished with streamers, targeting the larger fish, and caught two each before lunch. Greg landed a 19-inch lake run brown, and I landed one of the larger brightly colored spawning rainbows. In the morning we floated from Three Mile to

Bighorn takeout, then returned in the afternoon to fish the Afterbay down to Three Mile. The afternoon produced four more each, all good-sized fish. A satisfying day. Second day also produced well for John and Art who caught a number of large rainbows up to 21 inches.

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#### **Spring on the Big Horn**

Friday was windy and a bit warmer, the water clearing of muddiness from the prior week's rain. We headed for the 12 mile stretch from Bighorn to "Mallards". Many guides don't know this stretch well and it had not been fished for a week. We had the entire river to ourselves the whole day, except for Mark and John whom we saw in the afternoon. Five minutes from the launch directly across the river, I caught a large brown on the first cast, and another very fat rainbow a few casts later, and we thought we were off to the races with streamers. However, after two hours of no further action we switched to nymphs and San Juan Worms, which did the trick. I caught two more and Greg unfortunately got into two suckers. But moving on to a back

channel (chancey because it was not as clear as the main channel) brought good luck for the end of the day. Greg caught three, and I caught two, one other silver-colored lake run brown, and an 18-inch rainbow. And we had the only "double" of the trip. Brent's boat did about as well as we did. Mark with John and Art, not so well, only two to the boat in the morning and not much better in the afternoon I think. It was the only time I ever remember seeing Mark downright p----d off. But we all know that's just a part of fishing.

As always, this Leaning Tree Lodge fits us so well: excellent guides, superb food and

service, and the right size for a group of 6-8. Reece Lewis is forming another group to return there in September. Check the calendar or call Reece for details during the summer to join up with his group.



## 2018 Pebble Mine Opposition

Time to send comments regarding the proposed Alaska Pebble in the headwaters of Bristol Bay From the April 23 The Anchorage Daily News:

For more than a decade, Pebble has been trying to sell Bristol Bay on the idea of a major gold and copper mine at the headwaters of the world's largest sockeye fishery. Each step of the way, scientific evidence has indicated that this risky project would be profoundly detrimental to commercial, sport, and subsistence fisheries. Now, Pebble is trying to ride a wave of political and financial momentum to build its proposed mine.
