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Al (known to almost everyone as Al "Q") was born and raised in Brooklyn, New York. There, early in his childhood, he developed his love for saltwater fishing while living in Sheepshead Bay, once home to the largest commercial fishing fleet operating in the U.S. As a teenager he spent his formative saltwater fishing years on party boats, piers, bridges, beaches and jetties in and around Sheepshead Bay as well as Breezy Point, Rockaway and Jamaica Bay.

After moving to California in the late seventies to attend college, Al was inspired to switch from plugs to the fly rod. Here he began his fly fishing journey after years of reading articles written by saltwater fly fishing luminaries such as Joe Brooks, Lefty Kreh, Frank Woolner, Bob Popovics, Lou Tabory and our own Nick Curcione.


Al lectures and presents programs to many fly fishing clubs and fly shops in southern California. He founded the "One Surf Fly," an event which he created to help promote his favorite sport along the SoCal coast. Al also created the "Double Haul Ball," which is a free, educational and collaborative effort put forth by local fly fishing friends and Federation of Fly Fishers certified casters and is held once a year at the historic Long Beach Casting Club. Al and good friend Conway Bowman (of "Bowman Bluewater" and "Fly Fishing the World" fame) both host the Carp Throwdown at Lake Henshaw, San Diego each June. This Orvis sponsored event is mainly a sight-fishing tournament for carp-enthusiasts and has been widely recognized across the country. The tournament is timed around the hopper hatch so anglers can experience dry fly sight-fishing for cruising carp.

Al's articles and fly patterns have been published in Fly Fishing in Saltwaters, Fly Tyer, California Fly Fisher and Saltwater Fly Fishing magazines. He is currently on the pro tying staffs for Umpqua, Tuffleye and Enrico Puglisi. His Beach Bug pattern is one of the best selling SoCal surf flies in Umpqua's Surf Fly Series. Al's other commercial Umpqua patterns include Qs Corbina Candy, Qs Thin Lizzie and the Qs Ghost Whisper.

As an avid fly angler, fly tier, artist and photographer, Al continues to draw inspiration from the sea. He hopes to expand his passion and love of saltwater fly fishing through teaching and mentoring one angler at a time through "The Fly Zone," a comprehensive program he and his friend (and Wilderness Fly Fisher member) Jim Solomon created to help anglers learn to be better fly casters.



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

Bass fishing at Kelsey Bass Ranch the last weekend in April was challenging, but fly fishermen managed to bring to hand several impressive Florida strain largemouth bass. Rick Radtke landed 25 bass on Friday and Jerry Berman caught more bass than on previous outings. Rick and Jerry used traditional bass lures, e.g., plastic worms, etc., on fly rods. Larry's 'go-to' fly, the Woolly Bugger, was also effective. However, the top water action slowed through the weekend as the water cooled from water intake from the Merced River. Larry caught the largest bass of the trip on our last day of fishing.

Although springtime along the Merced River has been tempestuous, we had many spans of calm during which fishermen in float tubes, and fishing from lakeside, successfully attracted aggressive bass.

Good company around the campfire, and an excellent communal dinner Saturday night were highlights of this year's outing.

Camping beside Kelsey Lake and listening to the chorus of frogs, geese and birds, always offers a peaceful respite from our urban pace in LA County! I observed flocks of migrating birds such as white-faced ibis, and predatory ospreys, bald eagles, and common terms diving and over-flying the lake. It was the ninth year for Larry and me to camp and fish at Kelsey Bass Ranch, and it has never been a disappointment!

Member Corner



Take the California Fishing Passport Challenge Explore All that California Fishing has to Offer!

CDFW invites you to take a journey through California in pursuit of unrivaled fishing opportunities. Pack your bags, load up your tackle boxes, grab your favorite rods and reels, and prepare for fishing adventures across California's many lakes, rivers and ocean waters.

The California Fishing Passport Program challenges people to fish their way around the Golden State in search of 150 different finfish and shellfish species. This is a fishing incentive and angler recognition program and like a traveler's passport book, for each successful catch, participants receive special stamps in their books to mark their accomplishments.

Participants should take a photo of each new species caught and fill in the catch report section of the passport book with the date and location where the fish was taken. If no photo is taken, the angler can have a witness certify the authenticity of the catch. Anglers can receive passport stamps for each species they catch and document. To recognize the angler's achievements, the California Fishing Passport Program provides <u>awards</u> as anglers catch new species and gather more stamps.

Interested in accepting the challenge? California Fishing Passport books are available free of charge to all licensed anglers and children upon request from <u>CDFW license sales offices</u>, <u>official partners</u> and <u>authorized stamping agents</u>.

In an effort to recruit new anglers to the activity, the California Fishing Passport Program (with help from a federal Sport Fish Restoration Act grant) will hold several family friendly, free fishing workshops this summer.

The workshops will teach participants about many of the saltwater species in the passport book, fishing techniques, ocean conservation and angler ethics. Participants will also get to go fishing on a deep sea fishing boat, along with expert instructors, to apply the techniques learned in the workshops.

More details on the workshops will be available on the CDFW website by April 1, 2017.

When: Two hours (10:30 am to 12:30 pm) every Wednesday for seven weeks starting June 21st.

Where: Malibu Creek upstream of Tapia Park, just off of Malibu Canyon Road.

Who: Twelve (12) fly fishers will be working each week with 25 Wilderness Campers aged 13-17 years old. Summer of 2017 total will be 175 youth.

What: Two hour program for casting, demonstration fly tying, knots. Most of the time will be spent on the water.

Description: Every year the Salvation Army raises money to bring thousands of inner city children to the Santa Monica Mountains for a week-long nature experience. http://campmtcragsandgilmore.salvationarmy.org

This year, in partnership with Mountains Restoration Trust's environmental education program, 175 Wilderness campers will be exposed to the art of fly fishing. If you enjoy teaching youth and give back to the community, then please sign up. Your reward will be engaging the youth of Los Angeles in the outdoors and fly fishing along Malibu Creek. Announcing the SWCIFFF Riptide Rendezvous!

Calling all fly anglers! On Saturday, October 21, 2017, the SWCIFFF will hold its first annual "Riptide Rendezvous", a fly-fishing-only surf fishing contest. The event will be held at Rincon Beach Park in Carpinteria, Santa Barbara County.

There is no cost to enter the event, which will follow a format similar to Al Quattrocchi's previous One Surf Fly events. Anglers are restricted to the use of just one fly during the allotted fishing time, and all fish will be measured, photographed, and released. In addition to awards for first, largest and most fish caught, there will be a great raffle of fly-fishing and outdoor gear, with all proceeds benefiting the Southwest Council, International Federation of Fly Fishers and their related outreach programs.

Past surf fly fishing events have been a great place to see old friends, make new friends, and share a tale or two, on top of helping raise money for a worthy cause. Make sure you mark the date on your calendar!
